





Holidays

Holiday	A time away from work or school. Can be spent travelling.	British seaside holidays were popular in the 1950s and 1960s.
Seaside	A place by the sea.	Donkey rides, fairground rides and Punch and Judy shows were popular.
Souvenir	A thing that is kept as a reminder of a person, place or event.	You could play ball on the sand, dig sandcastles, sit on a deckchair, rent a beach hut, walk on the promenade, go rock pooling and paddle in the sea.
Promenade	A place for walking along the seafront.	In the middle of the 1950s, camping became very popular as a cheap holiday.
Entertainment	An activity for enjoyment.	Holiday camps like Butlins and Pontins were still very popular in the 1960s.
Deckchair 	A folding chair used on the beach.	In the 1960s, more people started to go on holiday to other parts of the world.
Pier 	A platform that sticks out from the land over the sea. Usually has entertainment, arcades and places to eat.	Souvenirs: These objects are collected on holiday to help remember the holiday.
Bandstand 	A covered outdoor platform for a band to play on.	Picture postcards can give us clues about holidays in the past.
